Turn, Turn, Turn

I don't know about you, but I was very pleased when I heard that Kate Bush was number one in the charts with her song, *Running up that Hill*, that she first released 35 years ago when it reached number three in the charts. She is of a similar vintage to me and I find her belated success somewhat comforting, especially in the current times when everything around us seems to be in flux. The song has become popular with a new younger audience thanks to the popularity of the television programme which features it *Stranger Things*.

This is not the first time that a pop song has had its popularity revived when it has been used as the theme song for a television series. Wheels on fire written by Bob Dylan and sung by Julie Driscoll, reached number five in the charts when it was first released in 1968. She re-recorded it in 1990 when it became the theme tune to the extremely popular comedy series, Absolutely Fabulous or Ab Fab as it came to be known.

The BBC not only used David Bowie's music for their series about a Manchester policeman who is catapulted back in time (or is he?) following a car accident but even used the title of one of his songs for the series; *Life on Mars* and another for the sequel Ashes to Ashes.

Songs are used in this way as they are often very evocative of their era and it makes one wonder what songs from the last few years might be used when the next generations want to recall our current situation, if indeed they do, with war in Europe, the pandemic continuing and rising inflation.

There are perhaps some obvious contenders; both the Ukraine and UK Eurovision entries are very much of their time, as such songs often are, but these may prove to be not as ephemeral as previous such songs. Another maybe from the Ukrainian punk band *Beton* who have followed the trend of reusing a previous song by reviving the Clash hit *London calling*, with their blessing, as *Kyiv calling*. Maybe some more Bowie might hit the mark. His song *Changes* gives us very appropriate words for these times in which we live

Ch-ch-ch-ch- changes Turn and face the strange

Our present world is full of changes and this can be very unsettling. I think therefore one more song revival would be appropriate. It was penned in 1950, although it did not become a hit until 1965 when the Byrds recorded it as *Turn, turn, turn* also known as *To everything there is a season*. The words were over 2,000 years old and were taken from the book of Ecclesiastes using a version very similar to those found in the King James Bible. The words represent one's journey through life while demonstrating God's eternal presence and love for us even as we sometimes struggle with that journey. That eternal presence has been with all of us throughout all that life has thrown at us over the last few years and will continue to be there whatever happens in the future and that is something that should bring us all great comfort.

I should like to conclude with the last line of this Byrds' song which sadly seems as relevant today as when the song was written

A time for peace, I swear it's not too late.

This particular event had the added significance of being the first such service for two years, following the disruption of the pandemic.
