New Things

As I write I've just returned from a few days away visiting relatives and friends in the north of England. I spent a lovely day with my (almost) 98 year old Aunt, who is still bright and astute and well up to speed with the issues facing our world and nation, as well as those affecting her family and loved ones. Her lifelong Christian faith remains very real. Her favourite expression of faith and trust in the Lord Jesus Christ is still, in the face of every challenge, "There will be a Way".

I travelled further north to see my brother, who lives in the idyllic Cumbrian village of Bowness-on Solway, right on the border of Scotland. David treated me to a day out in Cumbria, visiting some of the lovely coastal towns which are probably among some of England's best-kept secrets. The day was bathed in sunshine which created the most beautiful backdrop to the majesty of God's creation as we travelled the country roads.

My final destination was Greater Manchester and the sun was still shining! Friends took me to see RHS Bridgwater, which the Royal Horticultural Society website describes as "the fifth RHS garden and one of the largest gardening projects undertaken in Europe in recent years". The Garden is being developed on the site of Worsley New Hall, which is not quite so new today, having been built in the early 1840s, and having survived a fire and two world wars before finally being demolished a century later. But, in its time, Worsley New Hall, with its 154 acres of land was a significant residence and famously visited at least twice by Queen Victoria.

In the last two years the RHS has been beginning work on reclaiming the site and redesigning the landscape to bring new life to the former beauty of the gardens. Beneath a blue sky, and surrounded by the myriad colours of beautiful and creative planting, I could have been anywhere in the world. Further south, visitors to RHS Wisley would have been enjoying a very similar experience.

In today's world, where the media makes us witness to so much destruction and loss, it is good to remember that there are still places where life is being restored and new beauty is being unveiled. In recent months, and very locally, we have seen some of the green areas of our own Village refreshed, thanks to the work of residents in our community as well as that of our local Councils.

We are indebted to agencies like the RHS and the National Trust for their work of restoration, preservation and conservation. They, and so many others like them, are seeking to build for the future amidst a world of climate change and global warming. In a not dissimilar way, the National Museum of Scotland has recently been in the news as it prepares to return the House of Ni'isjoohl memorial pole to its rightful home among the indigenous people of what is now British Columbia. Here too there is a passion to make things right and make things new.

It was Abraham Lincoln who wrote: "I want it said of me by those who knew me best; that I always plucked a thistle and planted a flower where I thought a flower would grow".

Each one of us, in very many different ways, still has the opportunity to adopt and adapt for ourselves the philosophy of Abraham Lincoln! The thistles may seem metaphorical; so may the flowers, but they are real. All of us can seek to bring a measure of comfort where there is pain, a word of hope where there is despair, a moment of peace in the midst of desperate sorrow.

And Jesus, as my Aunt would certainly tell us, got there way before Abraham Lincoln. For Jesus is the Word of Life, bringing order out of chaos at the dawn of time. He is the Light of the World, which cannot be extinguished even in the places of greatest darkness. Jesus is the fulfilment of God's ancient promise: "See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland". (Isaiah 43:19)

And, at the close of time, God will say once again: "Behold, I make all things new." (Revelation 21:5)

The summer proved to be busy with our Children's Summer Camp and we had some lively days in the Café welcoming families and others who had chosen a "staycation" this year. We held a Children's Cooking Class and the children had great fun learning about some Egyptian dishes and making Egyptian hawawshi and um ali! They cooked food for themselves and still had plenty to take home to feed their families. We are now preparing for some adult cooking skills classes — our Basic Cooking Skills Course starts with a session on Thursday 7th September, 10am to 12.30pm. This is part of a series of classes which will help participants create budget friendly family meals.

We were delighted to welcome our new Silver Duke of Edinburgh students and some new volunteers.

External work at St Jude's Church Stonework

As you may have seen, our stonemason, Chris Anstey, has been busy working on the stonework of St Jude's Church, replacing damaged sections of the gable.



He will then deal with the damage by masonry bees, especially bad on the tower.

Chris is no stranger to St Jude's as he played a big part in our refurbishment in 2014 when the present Monsell Room was created.





These repairs to the stonework are vital for the preservation of this building for generations to come. The costs of these repairs are in the region of £16,000.

Please do be careful around the scaffolding. We apologise that the space for car parking will be limited for a while.

Grateful thanks are owed to near neighbours of St Jude's who have helped enormously by removing some of the vegetation which was threatening to cause further damage to the stonework.

Clock Face



A few years ago, we had the St Jude's Church tower clock mechanism overhauled which resulted in much better time-keeping. Now we are planning to have the rather weather-beaten clock face renovated sometime during the next few months. This will not be done on site — the clock face will be removed and then taken to a specialist firm in Derby for its refurbishment. This requires ecclesiastical permission and last month our application for that permission was displayed both inside and outside the church so we hope the work can soon proceed.

The cost of this work (with the scaffolding or lift device) will be in the region of £10.000.

We have not launched a formal appeal to provide for the cost of the work but clearly it is an expensive undertaking. If you are willing to help by making a donation please see below for ways in which you can do this. Thank you all. God bless you.
