It's Harvest time again! Once again a festival celebration offers us an opportunity to thank God for all his goodness to us in so many incalculable ways.

But these are also, in so many ways, hard times. The Covid 19 pandemic still casts its long shadow, with many still facing financial difficulty or ongoing health issues, both physical and mental. Conflict and natural disasters, the latter often the effect of climate change, continue to bring suffering and devastation to so many parts of our world. Imponderable questions still face us day by day — this past month for me has been my struggle and failure to make any sense of the sudden and tragic death of Tom. Tom was a young man of only 33, for whom I had the privilege of conducting his marriage in St Jude's to his beautiful bride, Madison, just five years ago. Tom leaves not only Madison, but their wonderful son, James, who is just two years old.

Within our community, bereavement — the loss of someone dearly loved — remains a major source of sorrow, just as it does in communities everywhere. Some, like Tom's family experience, in the words of a beautiful prayer, "the slenderness of the thread which separates life from death and the suddenness with which it can be broken". Others spend many months, even years, caring for a loved one as their health slowly declines. I am constantly humbled by the courage of those who have been bereaved, by their empathy with the situation of others, and by their generosity and thought for those around them. But I am equally as aware of the pain which never goes away.

Of late I have been looking more closely at the beautiful stained glass windows in St Jude's Church. Two in particular, both part of what is now the Monsell Room, were commissioned by John Monsell. The Revd John Samuel Bewley Monsell was at that time Vicar of Egham, but he was inspired to take up the vision of establishing a Church building in the village of Englefield Green. The first stone was laid on Thursday 28th October 1858, the feast day of St Simon and St Jude. The church was dedicated the following year, in July 1859. During that year the Church architect, Edward Buckton Lamb, created a large stained glass window in memory of John and Ann Monsell's son, another Thomas, who had died at sea in February 1855 on his way to the Crimea. Just a year or so later the Monsells were also to lose their eldest daughter, Elizabeth.

I was very struck that, whilst John Monsell had been faithfully pursing his vision for the foundation and care of the young St Jude's Church, he too was facing the agony of intolerable loss. No wonder he wrote the wonderful and very famous hymn; "Fight the good fight!" He too had his own battles.

And yet John Monsell had a thankful heart. The words of that hymn continue: "Cast cares aside, lean on thy guide; his boundless mercy will provide". Whatever his battles may have been, John Monsell continued to thank the Lord for all his love.

For those of us who have followed in his steps in ministry at St Jude's, John Monsell's shoes are big ones to fill! And it is his thankful heart that I have pondered in the last few days as I took a fresh look at this magnificent window. Life in the mid-19th century was as hard in many ways, and harder in many more, than life today. Yet John Monsell, like so many of those around us, learned to count his blessings.

Maybe John Monsell felt as many of us do — that life's losses and crosses, challenges and battles, are far better faced knowing that God is in them with us, rather than tackled without him. Even in our 21st century world God remains our provider, our strength and our peace. Please join us in giving thanks to him, not only at our Harvest Festival celebration but also at the end of the month, Sunday 29th October, when we celebrate St Jude's day, and rejoice that, whatever our circumstances, God will never offer us less than all his love.

Refresh and Repair!

The refurbishing of the external stonework of St Jude's Church has now been completed at a cost of about £16,000.

Thank you for your patience whilst the work was under way.

At the time of writing we are still waiting for confirmation that we have ecclesiastical permission to progress with the work on the clock face. We have not launched a formal appeal to provide for the cost of the work but clearly it is an expensive undertaking (it will cost in the region of $\pounds 10,000$).
