In every circumstance of our lives

As the schools' summer terms came to an end the children of Year 2 at St Jude's Infant School held their Leavers' Assembly in St Jude's Church. This beautiful service was entirely led by the children who first presented a drama inspired by the tale of the "Billy Goats Gruff". A group of young "kids" were looking for new things to do. The familiar things they had previously enjoyed didn't seem to appeal and were rejected as "BORING"!! To find new and exciting adventures it was clear that they would have to cross a bridge into new and unfamiliar territory. That was a scary prospect. There might be trolls lurking under the bridge and bigger "kids" on the other side.

But how would they know what it would be like on the other bank unless they plucked up the courage to set foot on the bridge? And so, reluctantly at first, and then with growing anticipation and courage, they decided to do just that.

It was a wonderful interpretation of what it was like for the children (none more than seven years old), and parents and carers too, as they contemplate the scale of the transition from Infant to Junior School. Familiar surroundings and familiar people must be left behind and the future may seem daunting. But there will be new friends, new opportunities, and new things to learn - and those things can't be missed.

The drama, prayers and poems were interspersed with songs as the children reflected that they are now "taller, stronger and wiser" and ready to make a new beginning. And woven through the whole presentation was the golden thread of gratitude - for everything that they had gained through their years as infants - and for everyone who had been with them on that journey.

This was one of the loveliest occasions I have enjoyed in St Jude's Church. Many congratulations are owed to the children, and to the Teachers and Teaching Assistants who invested so much hard work in planning, preparing, and presenting the service. It was good to welcome so many parents, grandparents, and carers to be with their children for such a truly special event.

And it left me with plenty of food for thought. All of us face change repeatedly in our lives. Some change is chosen, and we embrace it with joy. Some change comes unbidden and often unwelcome. Some change is way beyond our control and often brings sadness and loss. As the children sang at one point in their presentation: "being a grown-up isn't all it's cracked up to be"! Even as adults we can be fearful of what the future may hold.

I was very struck by the theme of thankfulness, which came out so strongly in the service. The prospect of change can bring a significant opportunity to express our gratitude to those who have cared for and accompanied us on our journey thus far. Change can also make us very aware of those who continue to walk with us on life's journey and who in so many ways try to ease the burden of painful change - or to share the joy of the good times ahead. And experience has sometimes shown us that change can often bring with it new friendships and fresh opportunities.

And so, I reflected afresh on the promise of the Lord Jesus Christ as he prepared to leave behind His friends and travelling companions. Jesus said, "I am with you always" (Matthew 28:20) In every circumstance of our lives, God has promised to walk with us, from here to eternity.

The BBC Newscaster and Reporter George Alagiah sadly died recently. One of his closest colleagues said of him "Journalism has lost a giant". As he journeyed through his diagnosis of cancer, George had reflected on how he had found strength and peace to contemplate the unknown future. He had learnt to receive each new day as a gift. Perhaps humanity too has lost a "giant". The Bible reminds us that God's love for us is "New every morning" (Lamentations 3:23) and that life itself is a gift from Him. As the summer unfolds and begins to give way to the challenges of the autumn let us thank God for all his gifts - and, most especially for the Lord Jesus Christ, God's "gift beyond words (2 Corinthians 9:15). A reminder that, during the summer holidays, our café is open each weekday from the slightly later time of 10am. It remains open until 2pm. A warm welcome awaits you!

Our Manager, Ali Griffin, writes:

"We've had a busy start to the Summer holidays, especially with the unsettled weather making the café a warm inside venue for children. Most classes have finished for the summer break. However we have a new Children's Summer Camp run by an existing teacher for three weeks which is proving popular. Another new class is Pilates for those suffering with mental health issues. This is a free weekly class offered by a company called Sport in Mind.

Our long standing D of E student Chloe finished volunteering with us. However she is replaced by two new students working towards their Silver Medal. One is working in the Cafe and one is taking control of our social media.

Students from St Cuthbert's School have been collecting items for our Baby Basics programme and came into the Village Centre last week to present us with approx 6 gift boxes filled with newborn essentials.

As I write, our new Fire Alarm system is being installed by John at GloBell. The system brings the centre in line with current fire safety regulations and means members of staff are instantly aware of where a fire is located in the building. All smoke detectors are remotely fitted to navigate around our listed building status. The system will be linked to mobile phones, so control can be managed remotely if needed.

Harrison's funeral directors held a service of remembrance and thanksgiving at St Jude's Church on Saturday, 22nd July to remember all those who had passed over the last 18 months. The service was very popular and Harrison's generously arranged for donations from the service to come to the Village Centre. This amounted to £325.00. Thank you all."

For some while now I've known that Paul would make a wonderful bishop somewhere — and over the course of the past few months it's become increasingly clear to me (among many others) that that 'somewhere' is here. I couldn't be more delighted.

Paul and I will be sharing in Episcopal ministry across the diocese. He will also have a particular brief as Champion for children and youth, vocations and the environment. As Paul lays down one mantle and picks up another, I'm really excited at all that the Lord has in store."
