10–11.30am Cakes, preserves, marmalade Do come along for coffee and a chat Chaplaincies are a major part of Christian ministry and the mission of the Church, and yet they are so often overlooked. In many ways, it might be argued that it is taken more seriously within the secular world — by hospitals, schools, universities, prisons, and the armed forces — than by the institutional Church itself. This is perhaps strange given that it is Chaplains (more than any other kind of minister) who are engaging with those not yet part of the community of the faithful. But what is it like to work as a priest in a secular environment?

A lot has changed in the 13 years since I started my degree in Chester. I grew up on the Yorkshire coast (my dad is a priest also) and have lived most of my life in the North of England, which is arguably more secular than the South. During my sixthform and university years everyone was obsessed with celebrity atheists like Richard Dawkins and Christopher Hitchens. It was cool to be a nonbeliever and weird to be religious.

That is no longer the case. Over the course of the last decade, there has been a resurgent cultural interest in faith and spirituality; it is now cool and 'alternative' to be religious. As such, working as a Chaplain is more interesting now than it has perhaps been for a while. The students are fascinated by faith ministers (whether priests, rabbis, imams, or gurus) and brimming with questions about God and meaning. Moreover, my staff colleagues are astonishingly receptive and supportive of the work that I and the other Chaplains do. The Chaplaincy is multifaith (mostly Christian and Muslim) and we all work well together to ensure that the breadth of religious diversity on campus is nurtured and supervised. I work mostly with Christian (all denominations) and Jewish students.

But, of course, a great many students aren't religious at all...

You hear lots of people say things like: 'I'm spiritual but not religious' or 'I feel like the universe is telling me to do this' or 'Let's generate some positive energy'. It is almost as though students are so clearly searching for God, but they're too afraid to say words like 'God', 'faith', 'religion', or 'spirit' - and so they use vapid and harmless substitutes that require no obedience or personal responsibility. However, rather than sneer at this I'm far more inclined to rejoice that they are actually on this journey to begin with. Listening to the students' diverse and colourful views, their desire for meaning and purpose, and attempting to (gently) direct them into a more substantial framework in which to explore their questions - is an immense privilege.

A lot of my regular commitments are ones you may already be aware of... morning and evening prayer, Evensong on Thursdays at 6.15pm and Sundays at 6.00pm with the Chapel and Founder's Choirs, midweek Holy Communion, a Celtic Prayer group, as well as a variety of courses (an upcoming Lent Course, Confirmation Classes, and Bible Studies). Then there are the day-to-day meetings with the Student Support and Wellbeing Teams for maintaining life and study on campus. All of this needs your prayer and support! Please particularly pray for our Interfaith Coffees as well as the ecumenical unity that the Chaplaincy, Catholic Society, Christian Union, and Christian Staff Group are trying to build together.

Encouraging students to attend their local churches rather than travel further afield has also been another (slow-moving) endeavour of mine. Royal Holloway sits entirely within the parish of St Jude's Church. I'm a big believer in grounding oneself by worshipping (near to) where you live — in the hopes of growing a community that encompasses churches, schools, neighbourhoods, marketplaces, charities... and a university!

I would love to explore more opportunities on how St Jude's Church and the Royal Holloway Chapel can work and worship together. We share a very similar twofold tradition, as the Chapel is both Nonconformist and Anglican. For instance, I would love the choirs to sing more at St Jude's, and for us to share the greater festivals together. Please pray on this and visit the Chapel soon. We would so love to see you!
