What does the name Lilian Forse mean to you?

Lilian is one of many men and women commemorated on our Englefield Green Village Memorial. Born in Bagshot Road in 1883, Lilian served in France during the First World War. On 10th April 1919 King George V presented her the Military Medal for her "admirable coolness in the performance of her duties". When the French Hospital in which she was working was bombed, Lilian stayed and cared for her patients and "carried on as if nothing had happened".

Lilian was the youngest of eight children. Two of her sisters sadly died at birth. She had one brother who was also recommended for the Military Medal. He served in the Royal Artillery in France until he died of wounds on 30th April 1918. Of additional interest to me is that two of her brothers were members of the clergy:

The Revd Edward Forse (1877-1942) was extremely clever; a prolific author who published 32 books. He is said to have been given to extraordinary traits of thought (which brings me some comfort!)

The Revd Leslie Forse (1882-1961) served as an Army Chaplain. Towards the end of the war, he spent seven months as a prisoner of war. His record of his time in captivity is held in the National Archive Kew. When peace came Leslie returned to ministry in England.

This newsletter includes a request for help. Mr John Scott, MBE is continuing his fascinating work on the Englefield Green Books of Remembrance, recreating the stories of more of those who left our village to secure our peace. If you have memories or photos which could increase our collective knowledge of these inspirational heroes, please get in touch.

Our journey through Holy Week is a powerful act of Remembrance. Palm Sunday is the curtain raiser. Jesus rides into Jerusalem, not on a magnificent thoroughbred, as might have befitted the King of all Kings, but on a humble donkey. G.K. Chesterton, in his poem "The Donkey", beautifully reimagines that moment:

For I also had my hour; One far fierce hour and sweet:
There was a shout about my ears, And palms before my feet.

At St Jude's, Palm Sunday starts with a procession into the church to begin our 9.30am service. No donkey, I'm afraid, but a procession of song followed by a service commemorating the first Palm Sunday, during which Claudia is providing a range of Palm Sunday activities for our children and young people in our Monsell Room. Please come!

The first Holy Week drew inexorably to its climax on a scaffold outside Jerusalem. It's hard to know whether Jesus' closest friends really understood what lay ahead for him. On what we now call Maundy Thursday, they gathered with Jesus for what was to be their last shared meal before his death. The evening is memorable not only for Jesus' distribution of the bread and wine, powerful symbols of his forthcoming sacrifice, but also for the moment he knelt and washed his disciples' feet. Taking the role of a servant, Jesus challenged his followers that they too must become the servant of others. Together we recall that evening in our Maundy Thursday worship at 7pm.

On Good Friday the "Hosanna" of Palm Sunday became the clamour of "crucify". Jesus stayed at the centre of the violence and noise, often silent, always calm, preparing for the ultimate offering of himself. The cross which marked his sacrifice is still honoured across the world. The Son of God, giving his life for the sons and daughters of humankind. Please join us for our Good Friday service at 12noon.

On Easter Eve the Gospel writers fall silent. We hold a vigil at 7pm on Saturday, awaiting the coming of the Light of the world. We renew our baptismal promises, preparing to welcome our Risen Lord!

Then, as Mary Magdalene did, we greet Easter Day outdoors with a service of praise and worship at 7am on the Village Green. Our usual service of Holy Communion is in church at 8am, followed by a Communion service with a family feel (and chocolate!) at 9.30am.

Remember with me this Easter those who gave their lives for our country that we might live. Remember above all our Saviour who gave his life for the whole of humanity that we might live eternally. We welcome you all to worship with us. *Judith Allford*

Can you help?

On Remembrance Sunday 2022, St Jude's Church was presented with a set of Books of Remembrance by Mr John Scott MBE on behalf of the Englefield Green Memorial Trust. These books record the names and stories of men and women from Englefield Green who gave their lives in wartime service. (WW1, WW2, and conflicts since).

Mr Scott is now working on a reshaping of three of the four books. The result will be a single, leather-bound volume "THE ENGLEFIELD GREEN BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE". where names, dates and stories are much more closely aligned. The lives of each of our Village heroes will each be honoured alongside the date of their sacrifice. This single "Book of Remembrance" will be kept by St Jude's in perpetuity. Long after you and I are gone, the stories of those who died to bring our peace will be remembered, their names etched on the War Memorial and their lives recorded within our beautiful church.

This is a huge piece of work — and your help is needed, please.

Is the name of one or more of your loved ones, relatives or ancestors recorded on the Village War Memorial within Englefield Green Cemetery?

We have some information, but there are other individual stories which are incomplete. There are names without photographs and dates without the details which bring the individual accounts to such vivid life.

If you have not already participated in this project, are you able to help, please, by providing photos and information about these heroes of Englefield Green who may have a treasured place in your own family history? Photographs and original records will quickly be returned to you.
